#### COURSE CONTENT:

This course is designed for students with no previous experience in Spanish language. It fosters speaking, listening, reading and writing skills through the understanding of Spanish cultures using the Communicative Language Approach.

The class will be taught in Spanish with clarification in English, providing students with a substantial experience with the language in a realistic and culturally relevant dynamics.

#### **COURSE GOALS:**

By the end of the course, students should be able to communicate in Spanish at the Novice Mid-level based on the ACTFL - American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages - guidelines. Students should be able to communicate minimally by using several words and memorized phrases limited by the particular context in which the language has been learned. They also should be able to read and comprehend simple texts on an elementary level and demonstrate an understanding of critical aspects of Hispanic cultures. Students will achieve these goals through a daily practice of vocabulary and structures within a conversational setting, readings and videos compiled to provide additional practice of vocabulary and cultural knowledge; and assignments pertinent to the material presented in class.

#### Federal Definition of credit hour:

For our accreditation, it is essential that all Framingham State University credit courses follow the Federal Definition of credit hour: for every one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction, a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work is required. Since the summer China courses meet for two contact hours daily (10 contact hours of classroom time weekly), the expectation is that students spend 20 hours per week doing out-of-class work. For the five week 4-credit course, this reflects 50 hours of classroom time and 100 hours of out-of-class time since the credit hour is defined as 50 minutes. Please make sure that your students are aware of this.

Description of the components of the course:

#### • Chapter tests and Final Exam:

There will be a total of **four chapter exams**, one at the end of each chapter (1, 2, 3, 4). **The Final exam will include materials from all chapters** but will be based primarily on chapter 5.

**THERE WILL BE neither MAKE-UP nor Re-takes FOR TESTS or EXAMS.** You must be present the days of exams. Only documented, official excuses will be accepted.

• Quizzes are at the discretion of the professor.



Quizzes may or may not be announced in advance. At times, quizzes will be taken directly from the assigned homework or activities for that day. You should ALWAYS be prepared for a quiz. There will be **no make-up quizzes**.

## • <u>Class participation, attendance and preparation:</u>

You can improve your participation grade by (1) coming to class on time, prepared and ready to participate on a regular basis; and (2) consistently interacting in Spanish with your professor and classmates. Regular attendance and homework preparation, positive class participation and interactive communication are evaluated and count in final grade.

## Homework:

This is a college-level course. In order to be successful you will need college-level skills in reading, writing, listening, speaking and note-taking. Plan to spend approximately <u>2</u> <u>hours</u> outside of class for every hour of instruction. Homework will be assigned after every class session on a daily basis.

## <u>Compositions:</u>

Short compositions will be completed in class, and be previouly announced. Grades will be based on content, grammar, style and other requirements. There may be some additional writing assignments in and/or outside of class. No outside help is permitted; plagiarism from any source or on-line translators will not be tolerated.

## In-Class Oral Presentation

**In pairs,** students will prepare <u>a brief dialogue presentation</u> based on what you have learned in the course. You and your partner will be able to have a short conversation and <u>speak for **two minutes**</u> on a variety of simple topics. You will be <u>given one</u> <u>situation</u> to review and practice with your partner before the day of the presentation. You will practice your responses for each situation. On the day of the oral presentation, you will present the situation in Spanish to the whole class. You will need to incorporate grammar structures and the vocabulary covered in class. Your grade will reflect your <u>individual and team work</u>. If you encounter problems while working with your partner, contact me before the due date. There is <u>not make-up option</u> for this <u>evaluation</u>. You will be graded on pronunciation, phrasing, and how well you present the dialogue. <u>Do not read your presentation</u>. You may have a 3" x 5" card with <u>ten key words</u> at which you may glance.



## Participation

Participation in class is essential and is directly tied to attendance. It means that you will <u>actively contribute to class and group discussions</u> both by asking and answering questions; it also means that you will willingly engage in class activities and that you will use the language of the course **always**. You must be in class to be able to get credit for class activities.

- <u>Preparation</u> It implies that you will have read the readings, written your homework, and accomplished any other pertinent assignment in advance of the class in which it will be discussed.
- <u>Attendance</u> It refers to the expectation that all students will attend every day, including the first day of class, and will arrive ON TIME. Absence from class, late arrivals and early departures, and regularly leaving and entering the classroom while class is in session <u>will affect your grade</u>.

## • Group Work -

Working with other students in pairs or small groups is an effective means of studying. Not everyone in the group needs to be at the same proficiency level. Teaching/assisting others is a very powerful way to learn the material. Make sure, however, that you do not simply copy another's work and turn it in as your own nor do the work for someone else. When working in pairs or groups the work of all participants should be reflected.

#### Classroom Courtesy:

Mutual respect is a core value in a language learning environment. Please remember to be kind to your fellow classmates since everyone is in the course to learn to communicate in a new language. Do not be afraid to make mistakes; it is part of the learning process. Refrain from distracting behavior such as eating and drinking, side conversations, arriving late, and leaving class while in session. Turn off and put away laptops and all electronic devices during class. <u>Students using unauthorized devices in</u> <u>class will be considered absent.</u>
