Course Description:

This course is intended to help students gain familiarity with the major genres of writing at the college level, ranging from the personal essay to email to creative composition. Students will be given instruction in and/or examples of each type of writing they will be expected to compose. Students will also cultivate the ability to critically reflect on their writing process and to comment intelligently and helpfully upon the writing of their peers.

Course Goals:

Students will develop skills in writing in a variety of different formats and genres in English, including personal essay, descriptive essay, comparative essay, response essay, summary report, textual analysis, business letter, formal electronic correspondence (email), review essay, and creative writing. Students will also learn the techniques necessary to review, edit, and constructively criticize the work of other students in the course. Finally, students will learn how to discuss their writing process with other students in the class.

Required Textbook:

Grading Policy:

- There are ten assignments for this course.
- 1. Each assignment is worth 10% of your final grade.
- 2. Each writing assignment will be 1-3 pages in length.
- 3. The professor will return graded assignments to students within 72 hours of submission.



- II. Grading Rules, Participation Policy, and Assignment Submission Guidelines
- 1. Students must submit all essays on time in order to receive full credit.
- 2. For each essay, students will be given a grading rubric that will help them to clearly understand what is expected of them by the professor.
- 3. Students must fully participate in all assigned preparatory activities in order to receive full credit for each assignment (for example, in order for students to receive full credit on the "Personal Essay", they must actively participate in the "Brainstorming personal essay topics" activity on "Day 3, Weds"; likewise, in order for students to receive full credit on the "Review Essay" they must actively participate in the "Group Meeting with Professor Codr" on "Day 11, Mon."
- 4. All assignments must be submitted in hard copy form (on paper, not as emails).
- 5. All assignments must be typed and formatted in accordance with the expectations outlined on day 1 of the semester.

Day 8, Weds: Correspondence (Part 1: Email) Response Essay Final Draft Due. Conventions (and problems) with email. Drafting a professional email.
