Course Description:

This course introduces students to the basics of public speaking, and will help them to cultivate the skills necessary to write and interpret a variety of different types of public speeches. Topics to be covered include attention getting devices, articulation and non-verbal communication, the ethics of public speaking, audience analysis, critical thinking and logical fallacies, the use of visual aids, persuasion, and group presentations. Each day will consist of a group discussion for half of the class and actual speech writing and speech practicing for the second half of class.

Course Goals:

- To cultivate the skills needed to write and deliver public speeches
- To learn how to analyze and assess speeches given by others
- To practice speaking in English
- To learn the differences between different occasions for speech and how to adapt speeches for different audiences and occasions

Required Textbook:

The text for this course is the Open Source textbook, *Public Speaking: The Virtual Text*.

Grading Policy:

Two hundred total points are possible. 100 points for daily activities and assignments, 100 for the four major speeches.



Daily activities and assignments: Students will be given 5 points for each day. 2 points will be awarded for actively participating in class discussion and 3 points will be given for active participation in the speech component of each class meeting. "Active participation" means arriving on time to class, taking notes, asking questions about the assigned reading, paying attention during the class (not using electronic devices for social media, shopping, playing games, etc.), doing any required tasks FOR THE DURATION OF THE TIME ALLOTTED TO THE TASK, and listening to and respecting your peers in the classroom.

Four major speeches: In addition to this component of your grade, students will give four major speeches, each worth 25 points: a persuasive speech, a toast or memorial speech, an informative speech, and a "how-to" speech. An optional final examination covering the assigned readings – worth a maximum of 20 points – will be available on the final day of the semester for students in danger of failing the course.
