Course Description:

World Religions in Historical Perspective is designed to introduce students to many of the major religious traditions in the world and their distinctive features. It provides students historical, theological, and philosophical familiarity with the belief systems of the most important religions of the world through close readings of their foundational texts. The first half of the course examines the earliest belief systems from the ancient Middle East and the historical development of Jewish, Christian, and Muslim ideas about God. The second half of the course examines the somewhat more mystical and philosophical traditions of Eastern belief systems by studying the fundamental assumptions of Hinduism, Buddhism, Daoism, and Confucianism.

Course Goals:

Students will be expected to summarize:

- 1. the belief systems of the Stone Age, Bronze Age, and Iron Age
- 2. the Jewish and Christian understandings of God and world creation
- 3. the Christian understanding of Jesus and his death and resurrection
- 4. the Hindu beliefs about reincarnation, liberation, and yoga
- 5. the Buddhist beliefs about nirvana and meditation
- 6. the Daoist and Confucian beliefs about the Dao



Required Readings will be made available during class.
