# **PSYC 224: SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY**

#### DESCRIPTION

PSYC 224 Social Psychology (Gen. Ed. Domain III-B):

An introduction to the factors and processes involved in people's understanding of themselves, others, and social interactions. Attention is given to research in such areas as social perception, gender, group interaction, attitude formation and change, aggression, social influence, interpersonal attraction, prejudice and discrimination, and pro-social behavior with particular emphasis given to differences relating to gender, race, and class.

Goal 1: Knowledge of Social Psychology

Objective 1: Students will develop a critical understanding of the scientific method and its application.

Objective 2: Students will obtain an understanding of major concepts, theories and research findings across a range of sub-disciplines within psychology.

Goal 2: Communication in Psychology

Objective 3: Students will learn how to present ideas and have productive conversations. Objective 4: Students will develop their scientific writing skills.

Goal 3: Personal Development Objective 5: Students will develop their social understanding and leadership skills.

#### REQUIREMENTS

Each week students will take an exam that covers course lectures and chapter readings. The exams will have multiple choice questions and two short essays. In addition, there are weekly written assignments (1-2 pages) based on in-class lab activities.

#### TEXTS AND MATERIALS

This course uses an Open Education Resource (OER) for Social Psychology provided by the University of Minnesota. The web link is <u>https://open.umn.edu/opentextbooks/textbooks/74</u> Other course materials will be distributed in class.

#### EVALUATION AND PERFORMANCE

Grades will be determined through the following major performance areas:

**Response paper** (65%) – You are required to submit a total of thirteen 2-page response paper throughout the semester. Response papers are critical reflections of the readings and are not a simple repetition of the material; instead, they are designed as a critique and reflection.

Attendance (8%) and participation (7%) - Show up on time and participate! A sign in sheet will be passed around the beginning of each class. You're allowed **two** unexcused absence after your 2nd absence you will receive ZERO for your attendance grade.

**Final paper (5-7 pages ~ 1500-1700 words) (15%) + Presentation (5%)** – For your final paper, you can pick any topic of your choice that will be covered this semester. Write a term paper which provides a small overview of how sociology (mainly) has explored or approached this phenomenon. Make sure to explain the basic issue/phenomena, concepts, the different dimensions of the issue that are interesting to sociology and any other information that you think is necessary to explain what we know and what we still need to know about the issue/phenomena. You are required to have a minimum of 2 peer-reviewed journal articles for your final paper.
